Agricultural Service Contractors, Farm Supervisors, and Specialized Livestock Workers:

Agricultural Service Contractors, who own and operate their own businesses, provide agricultural services such as livestock and poultry breeding, soil preparation, crop planting, crop spraying, cultivating, or harvesting. **Farm Supervisors** supervise the work of general farm workers and harvesting labourers. **Specialized Livestock Workers** carry out feeding, health, and breeding programs on dairy, beef, sheep, poultry, hog, and other livestock farms.

Job Duties:

Agricultural Service Contractors provide agricultural livestock services such as artificial insemination, spraying or shearing of livestock, or disinfecting pens, barns, or poultry houses. Agricultural Service Contractors provide agricultural crop services such as plowing, irrigating,

cultivating, spraying, or harvesting and assist in the development and implementation of farm safety and bio-security procedures. They hire and train workers and negotiate the terms of services to be provided. Agricultural Service Contractors also maintain financial and operation records and may participate in the provision of services or in the operation of machinery and equipment.

Farm Supervisors co-ordinate, assign, and supervise the work of general farm workers and harvesting labourers. Farm Supervisors supervise and oversee breeding and other livestock-related programs and supervise, monitor, and enforce procedures to maintain animal and crop health and welfare. They supervise and oversee growing and other crop-related operations and supervise maintenance of infrastructure, equipment, and supplies. Farm Supervisors also ensure farm safety, food safety, and security and bio-security are followed and maintain quality control and production records.

Specialized Livestock Workers formulate feeding programs and implement pasture or pen breeding programs. Specialized Livestock Workers perform general farm duties and follow safety and bio-security procedures. They recognize and treat certain livestock health problems and maintain livestock performance records. Specialized Livestock Workers also select livestock for sale, train horses, and may supervise general farm workers.

Working Conditions:

Work takes place in a controlled indoor setting, however in some areas temperatures may vary.

Work also takes place outdoors in various weather conditions.

Workers may also be exposed to infectious bacteria and viruses as a result of treating sick animals.

Working with equipment, instruments, machinery or power/hand tools can be a source of injury.


The workplace may contain strong odours.

Career Pathways:

The specific type of work done on a farm by this group of workers will depend on the training an individual has received. For example, Agricultural Technicians will handle various agricultural chemicals and solutions that they have been trained how to handle safely. Another example would be Horse Trainers, who are responsible for the overall health and performance of horses in their care. Jobs across this working group vary greatly
