

WE LIP Success Story | February 2023 WE LIP Annual Community Forum

Each year, the Windsor Essex Local Immigration Partnership hosts its Annual Community Forum. This year over 70 people attended the in-person event themed 'WE Believe in Youth' at École élémentaire Louise-Charron on February 16, 2023.

Charlotte LeFrank, Diversity Outreach Coordinator of Windsor-Essex Children's Aid Society and WE LIP Chair, welcomed the attendees and Kelsey Santarossa, Manager of Community Development Projects at Workforce WindsorEssex provided opening remarks in French.

<u>Liz Weaver</u>, Co-CEO and Director, Learning Centre from Tamarack Institute delivered a keynote message focused on the topic of "Communities Building Youth Futures." Council members were given the opportunity to explore ideas on how to build a more welcoming work environment for diverse





youth employee needs. The presentation also touched on strategies for meaningful youth engagement and highlights from the <u>Guide for Navigating the Future or work for Youth and</u> <u>Employers</u>.

Program updates were shared by Nandini Tirumala, Program Director from the South Asian Centre of Windsor and by Alicia Fleming, VP Community Impact from ProsperUs, United Way. Jillian Toman, Youth Programs and Services Manager from the New Canadians' Centre of Excellence Inc. also provided an update on the Virtual Enhanced Education Platform, Service Delivery Improvement Project.

Aman Ghawanmeh, Journalist from Canada Broadcasting Company announced their Newcomer Stories project and Gisèle Dionne, Executive Director, Association des communautés francophones de l'Ontario Windsor-Essex-Chatham-Kent (ACFO WECK) announced their new Volunteer platform called Cercle Bénévole / Volunteer Circle.

Throughout the event, the WindsorEssex Community Foundation hosted a booth with information promoting the Random Acts of Kindness day on February 17th.



In closing, students Chidera Ikewibe and Florine Ndimubandi from the University of Windsor performed a poem in English, and sang Mon Beau Drapeau in French respectively.

Michelle Suchiu, Vice President of Strategic Partnerships, Windsor Essex Local Immigration Partnership and Workforce WindsorEssex reminded council members that the forum set the stage for the Global Youth Summit taking place in the 2023-24 fiscal year. 
